



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Drowning in Australia

- -323 drowning deaths FY 23/24
- 10 yr average 278
- 3 hospitalisations for every fatality
- 82% male
- Highest drowning risk in u/5s
- 33% swimming and recreating
- Significant economic cost
- \$1.24 billion annually
- Significant social, emotional trauma
- <u>PREVENTABLE!!!</u>



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River drowning

- Consistently the leading location for drowning over the past decade in Australia
- 80% male
- Greater risk for adults and older adults than children
- Significant role of alcohol
 - Particularly during warmer weather & public holidays
- Higher risk in rural and remote areas
- Impact of flooding and extreme weather





- Significant investment including through grant schemes
- Range of benefits
- Equity of access to water for communities far from the coast who experience high temperatures
- Cheaper than building a public pool
- Get us outdoors and recreating in nature
- Improves physical activity levels
- Boost mood
- Lowers stress and anxiety
- Tourism and employment benefits

Risk Management Considerations

- Unique hazards and risks
- Environmental hazards
- Flooding, rainfall and debris movement, heat
- Site selection
- Phone reception
- Emergency access/egress
- Infrastructure needed
- Playground location/barriers
- Licensed venues and alcohol sales
- Designate alcohol free zones?



Risk Mitigation Strategies

- Develop a Risk Management Framework
- Conduct risk assessments
- Local Water Safety Planning Committee
- Develop a Local Water Safety Plan
- Zoning aquatic activity
- Designated swimming and recreation areas
- Supervision
- Safety Signage
- Public Awareness and Community Education
- Public rescue equipment





A Researcher's Perspective

Visitation

- Do we know who will be using these locations and for what purpose?
- Are they visitors or locals?
- Why are they choosing these locations?
- What is their swimming ability?
- Do they have experience swimming in these types of water bodies?

...A Researcher's Perspective

Lifeguard supervision

- Based on visitor numbers, should you provide a lifeguard service?
- How well does this concept transfer from the beach to the river?
- Do the public want or expect lifeguards?
- How do we keep people safe if no lifeguards or outside of lifeguard times?
- Can we restrict access at night?
- Risk appetite for public rescue equipment?
- Does the public know what it is and how to use it?

Communicating risks

- Signage is often ignored & doesn't impact behaviour
- Can be misinterpreted by non native English speakers
- Google Translate may not be our friend
- Are we discussing safety before people leave home?
- Where are they going to get information about these sites?





How we promote these sites and (don't) communicate risk

- Water quality not water safety
- Promotion of secret spots away from crowds
 - #inspo and info from Insta not land managers
- Good spots to 'take the kids'
 - Little consideration of safety, mentions of supervision
- Many sites link direct to council websites



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
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Is this the new Bondi? The outback towns planning beaches of their own
